1. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

RESOLVED to consent to these absences

2. MEMBERSHIP AND WELCOME

The Acting Chair for the meeting, Lucy Nutt welcomed members to the meeting and Josh Newham, Headteacher from Hazelwood School as an observer.

NOTED that If a member is absent for 3 or more consecutive meetings for any reason not acceptable to the Council, there shall be deemed to be a vacated place to be filled by the appointing body for that member

REPORTED that there continues to be a high number of vacancies on SACRE, in total 16. Ten vacancies in Group A – Religious traditions and Christian churches, three vacancies, Group B – The Church of England and three vacancies Group C – Teachers Associations.

Members reflected again on the work being done to recruit representatives. There was a strong commitment from the Local Authority in support of the SACRE and widening its membership and filling the vacancies was stressed. The commitment was not onerous, given that there were only three meetings year. Groups that can support recruitment include the Diocese of Westminster and London Diocesan Board for Schools as well as the recognised nomination bodies of the Hindu and Sikh Faiths.

An approach had been made to the Enfield Faith Forum for faith representative volunteers which had not proved fruitful.

3. MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON 16 NOVEMBER 2021 AND MATTERS ARISING

The Minutes of the meeting held on 16 November 2021 were confirmed as a correct record of the meeting.

REPORTED that all outstanding items under matters arising had been actioned, were in hand or included as an agenda item at this meeting.

Item 4 : AGREED SYLLABUS 2022 PREPARATION

RECEIVED an update from Lucy Nutt on the preparation for the Agreed Syllabus 2022 review, who had approached Enfield Headteachers to seek additional teacher representatives to join a working party.

REPORTED that an initial half day workshop had been arranged on Wednesday 9 March at 1.30pm - 4.30pm with a number of Enfield teacher representatives who had expressed their interest in joining the working party.

NOTED the purpose of the meeting would be to highlight and look at Enfield's current Agreed Syllabus, alongside receiving presentations from several syllabus providers, including, RE Today, Hampshire and Norfolk Councils on various approaches to RE which might be suitable for schools within the borough in the future. Following this there would be a subsequent meeting at 1.30pm-4.30pm on Monday 25th April 2022. This meeting will consist of the same group of teachers and focus on discussing the options presented during the first workshop before selecting which would be most suitable for the future of RE in Enfield.

RESOLVED that once the working party had met, conclusions would be presented at the SACRE meeting on 14 June 2022 which would reconvene as an Agreed Syllabus Conference so that members can be informed of the review of the current Agreed Syllabus and decide upon the future direction of the next one.

5. ANNUAL REPORT 2020-21

RECEIVED the Enfield SACRE Annual Report 2020-21 for review.

REPORTED that SACRE's have a duty to publish an annual report, ideally by the 31 December each calendar year but if necessary in the following calendar year. The report is sent to the Secretary of State for Education as well as NASACRE, as well as to key partners, including schools and published on the Enfield SACRE website.

NOTED that the main purpose of the annual report is to hold the LA to account, by informing the Secretary of State and key partners what advice SACRE gave the LA during the year and how that was responded to and includes advice on RE and Collective Worship in those schools for which the LA has responsibility.

NOTED that the membership be updated to include Revd. Ian Crofts. Apologies were expressed for this omission.

RESOLVED that the updated Enfield SACRE Report 2020-21 be forwarded to the Secretary of State for Education and NASACRE.

6. NASACRE VIRTUAL TRAINING SESSIONS

RECEIVED details of the NASACRE virtual training plan 2021-22.

REPORTED that Sally Moore had attended the NASACRE session on 'What do SACREs need to know and understand about Worldviews'.

NOTED that it had been a very interesting session sharing an overview of what the term 'worldviews' means in a number of different disciplines and reflections on how it provides useful concept from which teachers feel more equipped to teach RE.

Members thanked Sally for providing feedback on the session.

7. HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY 2022 FEEDBACK ON LIVE EVENT

RECEIVED feedback from Rabbi Keren on Enfield's Holocaust Memorial Day event which was broadcast on the Council's YouTube Channel. The event represented Enfield Council's third year of delivering an online Holocaust Memorial Day commemoration after doing so successfully in both 2020 and 2021. By delivering the event to people on Enfield digital platforms it was hoped it could be made truly inclusive and accessible to all.

As one of the presenters, Rabbi Keren reflected on the content and the virtual broadcasting platform that had been used again and expressed for the future that both a physical as well as a virtual event be considered and involve children voices in song or by reading poetry as in previous years.

This year the Project team had worked closely with a local film company to produce a really inspiring new film as the centrepiece for Holocaust Memorial Day 2022. The film titled, 'One Day' reflected the national theme for this year's HMD, and featured contributions from local residents and some of Enfield Council staff who had brought to life, by reading, real life testaments of those who have suffered as a result of historic genocide across the world. Rabbi Keren expressed that this was most compelling and moving to watch.

The whole event ran for 60 minutes and as well as the new film featured supporting contributions from local religious and civic leaders. The event was pre-recorded for broadcast and can be viewed for the remainder of the month, February 2022 and beyond via this link, which to date had received 460+ views.

SACRE members warmly thanked Rabbi Keren for the feedback provided and agreed that feedback should be provided to Council Officers that either the Dugdale or the Millfield Theatre be considered for the HMD event in 2023.

8. UPDATE FROM SACRE RE ADVISOR

RECEIVED a national RE update from Julia Diamond-Conway that included details on RE CPD and networking opportunities and new RE resources:

- **Inspecting RE: An examination of Ofsted Inspections**

The publication of the [Religious Education Research Review](#) was greeted positively by many teachers. NATRE has examined the inspection reports published between 1st May - 14th Oct 2021. NATRE investigates whether inspectors are taking account of the factors identified in the research and if this is improving the potential of inspections to drive up standards in RE.

- **Analysis of teacher survey on Secondary RE and RS**

A ninth secondary NATRE Survey – July 2021 was conducted during the spring term of 2021 via a number of teacher networks supported by the National Association of Teachers of Religious Education (NATRE), and RE Today Services. Conclusions can be drawn around provision, GCSE entries, timetabling and the supply of specialist RE teachers.

- **Religious Education and the lack of support by government funding**

A written parliamentary question tabled has led to the government sharing that it has been supporting curricular projects in many areas of the curriculum but has allocated no funds on religious education specific projects in the last 5 years. The RE community are asking people to write to their MPs to ask if this can be changed.

- **NASACRE'S SACRE Self-evaluation tool**

The NASACRE development group has worked hard on reviewing, updating, and improving the SACRE self-evaluation tool. This tool will enable SACREs to consider their effectiveness in all areas of its work in order to produce a targeted and costed Development Plan in partnership with your LA.
